## **UPRIVER CONCERNS**

**Boating Safety Meeting...** Close to 100 residents, cottagers and interested people attended a public meeting at the Bass River Country Club in Bass River, N.B. on August 7, 2010 to discuss boating safety and other issues related to the ever-increasing recreational usage of the Richibucto River. Mr. Ralph Johnston graciously agreed to chair the community meeting and made a brief opening statement that public concerns would be recorded and in the future our MLA would be approached. He shared relevant points from government sources related to boating restrictions in most provinces, referring to the "The Boat Safety Guide" issued by Transport Canada. For little over an hour anyone who wished to speak and voice their concerns and possible solutions were given the opportunity. The area of the river that was emphasized was from the Bass River to Brown's Yard bridge, the narrow and most congested part of the river. Some concerns were: fast noisy boats causing large wakes, mufflers

wide open, environmental concerns, unfamiliar with channel, too close to other craft and docks, swimmers safety, people relieving themselves in the river from boats, swamping kayaks, canoes and pontoon boats and young drivers on sea doos dangerously hauling youngsters on tubes. Some attending the meeting expressed they observed a number of instances that could have led to very serious accidents. At the Brown's Yard bridge many boats tie up and socialize. One property owner stated there is no washroom and his property is being used as one, including defecating and leaving tissue.

Another issue is loud partying near the bridge and on the river disturbing residents late at night. It was decided that a "no wake" zone was impracticable as there is a wake regardless of boat speed. A discussion took place about placing buoys in the river at Brown's Yard and Bass River and signage at Rexton and Richibucto to advise boaters to slow down, be courteous and follow the law. Many felt this was a good idea and should be explored so a small committee was formed. The meeting came to a close when Harley Thompson's statement "The river is to be enjoyed by everyone, just slow down and be respectful", received loud applause. Submitted by Edna Thompson
